When this couple became empty-nesters and moved from their large suburban home to a smaller one-story condo in Evanston, Ill., it was their mission to remodel the historic condo into a place of French Victorian romance. Although the dwelling had been remodeled in the '80s, the makeover was poorly done, and it gave Jennifer a blank canvas to begin anew.

"The lady of this home had a love for red with accents of black and complementing hues," Jennifer says. "We had a well-laid-out plan, until she became lovestruck after a trip to Paris. She changed her mind on many levels, and we went with it, making the final design exactly how she wanted, with enhancements much closer to reflecting her experience in Paris. She was a joy to work with, modifying the plans while staying dedicated to the Victorian look and feel, and keeping to her original color palette."

THE HEART OF THE HOME

When it came to redesigning the kitchen, Jennifer found some pleasant surprises. "We gutted it down to the studs, and behind layers and layers of drywall, we discovered the original brick," she says. "The homeowner also found the original doors thought to be maple; instead, they turned out to be white birch with very pretty grain. We agreed to restore them to their original glory."

The kitchen took on a Parisian feel with splashes of red displayed in appliances, décor and curtain fabrics. The lady of the house brought back inspirations from her Paris hotel, including French-style black and white patterns, wrought iron window accents and smooth velvet finishes on black cabinets and furnishings. The clever planning gives one the feeling of spaciousness-which is always a challenge in the small, narrow spaces reminiscent of the Victorian era.

Personal touches both whimsical and functional include hanging pots for space-saving efficiency, 9.5-foot-tall ceilings, a tilt-down wastebasket

beneath a narrow counter space and a pot-filler faucet above the stove.

All of the cabinetry was built with exposed hinges reminiscent of the Victorian time period, and treasures like Parisian signage grace the walls and doorways.

Bringing the look of Paris's most luxurious spaces continued into the master bathroom, where the area was transformed into a place of respite with a touch of refinement. The color palette continued in the black and white theme, with a splash of taupe to soften and visually widen the modest-sized bathroom. The flooring came to life with marble mosaic tile creating a beautiful pattern, which ultimately complemented both the painted linen cabinets and the soapstone countertops.

While staying dedicated to the Victorian look, there are modern amenities for comfort and safety, including the new shower and claw-foot tub and light fixtures that were brought back from a previous home.

Victorian accents grace the wall above the sink, complete with a custom mirror that doubles as a recessed medicine cabinet. The final renovation now allows the homeowners to relax in Old World charm and pampered indulgence with modern amenities, while enjoying the look and feel of a vintage powder room complete with the original radiator.

LIVING THE LIFE YOU LOVE

When a homeowner downsizes, it's a challenge to bring all the comfort and opulence of a large home into a smaller space.
